LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends,

What a long strange year it has been! 2020 got off to a pretty unassuming start but took a wild turn in the middle of March. Thankfully, United Way of West Georgia had wrapped up our 2018-2019 campaign and we were about to make allocation funding decisions when COVID-19 made its appearance. Nothing has been the same, except that United Way has been here, serving the community as usual and supporting our partner organizations both financially and with encouragement and guidance.

Funding decisions were delayed for 2020, and partner agencies were funded at 2019 levels through June while we accessed what the effects of COVID-19 were going to be on the community. Obviously, some of our partners were forced to close for a period of time, while others like LaGrange Personal Aid, the Interfaith Food Closet and Salvation Army had to be creative in the way they provided services to continue to fill the large need for basic services in our community.

In May, the United Way of West Georgia, The Callaway Foundation and the Community Foundation of the Chattahoochee Valley announced the creation of the Troup County Emergency Relief Fund to raise funds to address the immediate and basic needs of economically vulnerable populations caused by loss of work or reduced wages, school and business closures, and the increased demand for healthcare information and support among our most vulnerable community members. Over \$161,000 was raised, which included a \$50,000 matching contribution from the Callaway Foundation. Grants were made through the fund to local 501(c)(3) organizations who were established in the community, and were prepared to distribute the funds to those affected financially by COVID. Our work was recognized by United Way Worldwide, who gave us a grant of \$20,000, as well as many generous individuals and organizations. A total of just over \$100,000 has been awarded as of December 31, 2020. Applications for funding can be requested through the United Way website: www.unitedwaywga.org.

In September, time for our annual Campaign Kick-off, COVID-19 was still around, which called for some serious adjustments to our campaign. Thanks to Cedar Cross Media, Tommy Britt, from WellStar West Georgia Medical Center, and Shandaleia Shepherd, from Kimberly Clark, we were able to host a virtual campaign kick-off, and the campaign was off and running! On a sad note, however, we like many other organizations were forced to cancel our fund raising event, LaGrange Has Talent, in 2020. We are hopeful that by Fall of 2021 we will be able to bring it back.

This has definitely been an interesting year to say the least, but through it all, United Way has remained strong, and continued to serve the community. We are looking forward to what 2021 brings, but whatever it is, we will be here for you and our community.

Thank you for your contributions of time, talent and treasure to make our work possible.



2020 Campaign Kickoff Co-Anchors

The Campaign Kickoff took on a whole new dimension in 2020. With COVID-19 still around, we went to a virtual format featuring Shandaleia Shephard, from Kimberly Clark and Tommy Britt, from Wellstar WGMC serving as Co-Anchors for the production. This year's campaign theme was: LIVE UNITED, It's a Way of Life!

The Virtual Kickoff featured a few Executive Directors of United Way Partner Agencies. First was Dan Wooten, Executive Director of the Active Life Centers in LaGrange, Hogansville and West Point. Dan described the various activities available at the Active Life Centers. He emphasized how everything they do at the centers is designed to keep seniors active, healthy and independent for as long as possible. Paul Stedman, from LaGrange Personal Aid and Interfaith Food Closet was the next featured speaker. He explained how LaGrange Personal Aid can change lives by helping people out of financial emergencies with rent and utility assistance, as well as many other types of aid. He also talked about providing food for those in need. Michele Bedingfield from Harmony House was the final guest speaker. She talked about the services Harmony House provides for those in a domestic violence situation, as well as some of the preventive services they provide. All three directors spoke to the need for supporting United Way financially in our community because one contribution impacts all 25 United Way partner agencies.

Grants are awarded annually by qualified volunteers to these highly vetted community organizations after a review that includes community impact, program design, financial capacity and operating performance.

In 2020, the UW of West Georgia Community Care Fund invested \$702,067 directly into the following highly impactful organizations:

Boy Scouts of America - Chattahoochee Council Provides fun, educational experiences that instill values in young boys and prepares them to make critical choices over their lifetime in achieving their full potential.

Boys & Girls Club of West Georgia Provides daily after-school and school-break activities that enable all young people (especially those who need it most) to realize their full potential as responsible, productive, caring citizens.

CASA of Troup County Provides screened, trained, supervised adult advocates who represent the best interest of abused and neglected children involved in juvenile dependency proceedings.

Children's Advocacy Center of Troup County Provides facilities, multi-disciplinary teams, and coordinated systems that minimize trauma to child abuse victims during investigations.

Communities in Schools of Troup County Provides case management, mentoring, tutoring, enrichment programs and other services that surround students with a community of support, empowering them to stay in school and achieve in life.

Empty Stocking Fund, Hogansville Provides toys and gifts to children and families in need at Christmas, promoting a sense of "caring and sharing" to our future community leaders.

Foster Grandparents Program Connects seniors with meaningful volunteer opportunities with children in care centers, schools and other agencies, which makes a difference in the lives of both children and volunteers.

Girl Scouts of Greater Atlanta Provides fun, educational experiences that build courage, confidence and character in young girls to help them succeed in school and life.

Good Shepherd Center of Georgia Baptist Children's Homes and Family Ministries Provides residential, oncampus education and other services for adolescent boys coping with the effects of abuse, neglect, abandonment and other related issues.

Harmony House Domestic Violence Shelter Provides emergency shelter, crisis intervention, education, and advocacy for adults and children who are victims of domestic violence.

Interfaith Food Closet Provides temporary and emergency food, baby items and personal care items to people in need.

LaGrange Personal Aid Association Provides financial and other assistance to people during times of distress, illness, disability, or financial difficulty.

Literacy Volunteers of Troup County Recruits, trains and supports volunteers to tutor adults needing to improve their English, math and computer literacy skills.

Maidee Smith Early Care & Learning Center Provides safe, affordable, age-appropriate quality childcare and early childhood education.

Salvation Army Provides financial assistance for rent and utilities to people in emergency situations.

Self Help Harbor Provides a safe, secure place for all 12-step addiction recovery programs to meet.

Senior Companions Program Provides volunteer service opportunities for active low-income seniors that builds self-esteem and contributes to their mental and physical well-being by helping at-risk elderly maintain their independent status and remain in their homes.

Special Olympics, Troup County Provides sports training and competitions for people with intellectual disabilities, giving them opportunities to be active citizens in our community.

Success by Six Provides leadership, resources and services that ensure children enter school better prepared to learn.

United Way Initiatives



The mission of Success by 6 is to ensure that children in West Georgia enter school better prepared to learn.

We are a community partnership focused on improving school readiness through a strong network of public and private resources. We collaborate with school districts, child development centers, community organizations, local government and others to promote the healthy development of all children from conception through age five.

Everything we do at Success by 6 is in pursuit of one of the following goals:

- * Increase awareness of the importance early learning plays in school readiness *
 - * Improve the quality of education provided at child care centers *
 - * Ensure all young children have books in their home and are read to daily *

We work towards these goals through a number of fantastic programs, however, the Coronavirus made the execution of some of these programs impossible during 2020.

Weekly Class: Normally from September to May, we host a weekly class for children and parents focused around a different letter of the alphabet. Due to COVID-19 classes have been discontinued since March of 2020.

Summer PLAY: In 2020, this summer program was cancelled due to COVID-19, in 2021 Success By 6 will be providing literacy resources to four Early Learning Centers for their summer programs through an initiative called Summer Play on Wheels.

Weekly Readers: Since March 2020, Weekly Readers have not been able to go into Early Learning Centers to read to the students. Some volunteers read through Zoom. The LaGrange Youth City Council took on Early Literacy and with the help of the PR department at the City of LaGrange eleven students read and recorded 55 books. They put the videos on a United Way Success By Six YouTube channel for all to enjoy.

Childcare Mentorship: We work to provide support to the director and staff of Maidee Smith Early Care and Learning Center by visiting weekly, providing activities, ideas and suggestions, and modeling teaching strategies. The in person visits to Maidee Smith had to be suspended mid-March of 2020 due to the virus, but emails, texts, and phone calls have continued plus materials and books have been dropped off.

Book Distribution: Even though COVID-19 changed the way books were distributed, we found creative ways and partnerships to continue to safely get books into the homes of children. For example, books were distributed weekly through the Troup County School System feeding sites at local elementary schools and a partnership was formed with the Calumet Neighborhood. We are always looking for more ways to share books with as many children as possible; even with COVID-19, over 4700 books were given to children in Troup County during 2020!

Each year, **Success by 6** expands outreach in the community. As we look forward to 2021, we continue to actively pursue opportunities to reach, engage, and educate more and more children and parents in West Georgia.

Due to the Coronavirus, in 2020, our readers were not able to go into the Early Learning Centers as they usually do. We are hopeful that when school starts Fall of 2021, Covid rules will be relaxed and volunteers will be welcome in the centers again.

Typically, our readers go into early learning centers, including Maidee Smith Early Care and Learning Center; Teaching, Loving, Caring Learning Center; Pride and Joy Daycare Center; Happy Days; and Yvette's Little World.

Each reader shares a book, discusses a career with the children, and talks about what they want to do when they graduate from high school. With an influx of new readers in 2019, we were reaching more children than ever.

Focus Issue: Early Childhood Education

In addition to supporting our 25 partner agencies around each of their individual missions, we also work to provide opportunities for collaboration across agencies, making the work of each more impactful. While looking for unique ways to increase impact, the need for action around early childhood education and school readiness became clear.

Children in West Georgia are reaching kindergarten with vastly different experiences—some completely ready to learn and others without exposure to basic ideas such as colors, shapes and letters.

With so much of a child's brain development happening before the age of five, it's critical to reach children and parents as early as possible and in as many ways as possible. United Way of West Georgia is playing an important role in leading much-needed community change around early childhood education.

Magnolia Society volunteers have raised funds, over \$130,000 in six years, for early childhood education through annual events, first Merry Market and most recently LaGrange Has Talent. Five years ago, we asked these committed volunteers to come together to create a Women's Leadership Council, creating more structured and ongoing opportunities to raise awareness around early childhood education. Our Women's Leadership Council, the *Magnolia Society*, has brought together a diverse group of women to raise funds in support of early childhood education and to lead the community in taking action.

In West Georgia, there is a striking lack of understanding of how critical the first five years of a child's life are to their ongoing education. A child's brain develops 80% of its capacity by the time he or she reaches the age of three. By five, the brain has developed to 90% of its capacity. Many parents don't realize how important it is for them to read to, sing to and talk to their young children. They assume education starts in kindergarten, when in actuality, it needs to start at birth.

If a child enters kindergarten behind, their chances of reading on grade level by third grade are much slimmer. If that child isn't reading on grade level by third grade, they are four times less likely to graduate from high school.

In 2019, a group of dedicated community leaders who had formed Get Troup Reading, attended a Get Georgia Reading Summit. Get Georgia Reading is a partner of the national Campaign for Grade Level Reading, which focuses on ensuring that children are reading on grade-level by the end of third grade. The Summit was very energizing and this group decided to bring a similar event to LaGrange. They began by holding a stakeholder's meeting to gauge the interest in the community and finding a lot of support they went on to organize the first Get Troup Reading Summit. The local summit was held on February 8, 2020 and hosted over 125 people. There were state level experts as well as local professionals who presented at the Summit. Speakers included Arianne Weldon, Executive Director of Get Georgia Reading, Garry McGiboney with the Georgia Department of Education, Representative Randy Nix, Judge Michael Key and Troup County Superintendent, Brian Shumate, TCSS Assistant Principal, Deanna Brown and Point University Professor Lacey Sutherland. The summit was free of charge and attendees who were Early Learning Center teachers, directors or Pre-K teachers received 4 hours of continuing education credits.


Interest in Get Troup Reading continued to grow, and in May of 2020, Kim Myers was hired as the Director of the program. There are now three working committees – Healthy Babies and Toddlers which focuses on Pre-natal to 3 year olds; School Readiness, focuses on three and four year olds; and School Success focuses on Kindergarten through third grade. 
LaGrange Has Talent was cancelled in 2020, but will return November 18, 2021.

Early Learning efforts continued to be provided throughout 2020 made possible through the proceeds of previous years.

- Over 5,000 books were distributed throughout the community at schools when the lunches were picked up, at community events, delivered to Little Free Libraries and were taken to Early Learning Centers.
- Also in 2020, The Magnolia Society, United Way Women's Leadership Council, served as a conduit for the publication and distribution of Miriam Lukken's Book. Copies are available in the United Way office.



Troup County Emergency Relief Fund



In March 2020, when the Coronavirus really arrived on the scene and started making big changes in our lives, many local United Ways began creating funds to allow them to assist those who had been most affected in their communities. The United Way of West Georgia began conversations with The Callaway Foundation and the Community Foundation of the Chattahoochee Valley about creating such a fund for Troup County. The Callaway Foundation pledged a \$50,000 match for the first \$50,000 raised.

In May of 2020, the Troup County Emergency Relief Fund was launched on the United Way website. This provided individuals and businesses a way to contribute to the fund and for 501(c)(3) organizations to apply for grants to assist the most vulnerable in our community who were being affected by the Coronavirus.

The generosity of the community was amazing. In addition to many generous individuals, the fund received contributions from Truist Financial Foundation, the United Way of West Georgia, The Charter Foundation, the LaGrange Rotary Club, Georgia Power, United Way Worldwide, the Troup County Center for Strategic Planning and the generous Callaway Foundation match. In all, the Fund raised over \$161,000 by the end of the year.

The Grant Committee for the Fund made their first grant awards on May 15, 2020. As of December 31, 2020, just over \$100,000 in grants have been awarded to 17 local organizations. Through these organizations rent, utilities, food, PPEs, air purifiers, sponsoring a blood drive, setting up telehealth equipment and much more have been provided for those in Troup County who have been most adversely impacted by the consequences of the Coronavirus.
